Horton Kirby and South Darenth Parish Council Chair Report

During the last twelve months, the Parish Council has tried, as always, to represent the people who live in or visit our two villages. Whether by having a say on new development, providing new facilities, improving existing ones or arranging community events.

If we take each one these at a time, I will explain a little further.

The Parish Council has looked over and made representation to Sevenoaks Council on some **40** planning applications (less than the preceding year) but there are some very emotive and controversial sites included in this number. We have also commented on 4 sites in the local plan in our parish and the potential large development at Pedham Place.

Grant applications were successful and allowed us to install the adult gym equipment in Heathside and to provide temporary installations of silhouettes to remember those lost in battle on the centenary anniversary of the end of the First World War.

The old school building next door has been registered as a community asset, and potential future use discussions are on going with the buildings owners.

Much work has been done to enable power and light to be provided in Heathside and the imminent arrival of the much requested public toilets.

The Parish Council has also refurbished the toilets here in the Village Hall, refreshed the kitchen, and made the pavilion in Westminster Fields watertight by the provision of a new flat roof.

Although postponed due to the off-chance that the England football team could make the World Cup Final, the inflatables day in Westminster Field was enjoyed by those that attended. We were lucky with the weather for both our annual fireworks night and beacon lighting. But not quite so lucky with high winds reducing the activities we could provide at the recent St George's day fete.

As a Parish Council we are able to make financial grants to local charities and organisations that provide a service or benefit to local people. These include: £1000 to Beams for a new safe space bed £500 to Horton Kirby Cricket Club towards a new mower £300 to the Bowls Club for new outdoor benches And £400 for St Mary's Church for new lighting to the bell tower.

The above achievements are only a small indication of the work undertaken by the Parish Council and I must now take time to thank those that make all of this possible.

Thanks first to Roger Gough of Kent County Council for the information and guidance from KCC (although we still don't have a chevron sign on the Franks Lane Bridge! Sorry Roger).

Congratulations to Phillip and Brian on their re-election to Sevenoaks District Council and obviously commiserations to those unsuccessful. The support given often helps bridge the gap between Parish and District. Unless it's the Westminster Field one.

Within the last 12 months, there has been a change in our office with Dawn Mcfall leaving for pastures new and Lisa taking her place. The Parish Council could not function without Heather and Lisa's help and guidance of which I'm sure all councillors are extremely greatful with Email inboxes are kept really busy!

Thanks must also be made to Keith who unlocks and locks the gates at Westminster Fields (amongst other tasks) on a daily basis.

Now turning to members of the Parish Council. You may have noticed a new boy in the midst with Tristan Ward joining to replace Colin who has now left. Indeed welcome, Tristan, and we look forward to working with you...

Although no longer a member of the Parish Council, no doubt we will all see Colin around and wish him well.

Lastly I must thank all of my fellow Parish Councillors for their many hundreds of voluntary hours. Be it attending committee or Parish meetings, phone calls or emails, attending events or, it has been even known for get togethers in local hostelries. Without their enthusiasm and dedication, trying to make a difference to where we all live or visit would be a huge undertaking.

Kent County Councillor Roger Gough's report to Horton Kirby and South Darenth Parish Council Annual Parish Meeting 13th May 2019

I continue to serve as Member for the County Council Division of Sevenoaks North and Darent Valley, which runs from Swanley Village to Seal Chart. I also serve as Cabinet Member for Children, Young People and Education, overseeing the Council's work with schools, Early Years, children's social services, youth services and much else.

In terms of Highways, we have had a less severe winter than in the previous year. We have also started, earlier than in previous years, the 'Find and Fix' or 'pothole blitz' campaign. Since just before Christmas, Sevenoaks District has seen some 3,358 potholes fixed, and 75,119 square metres of road patched, both ahead of the County average. The County Council is committing significant resource to highways maintenance for the coming financial year. As before, the best way to report a pothole or other highways problem is through the reporting tool on the KCC website.

I have continued to work with the Parish Council on Highways issues. The biggest Highways development of the year was the introduction of 40mph speed limits (in place of 60mph) on The A225 Dartford Road up to the boundary with Sutton at Hone. This was linked to similar changes taking place on the Farningham side, notably on parts of the A20. While there have been a number of matters that have required further work, notably regarding all the associated signage, overall I do believe this is a positive and welcome step.

About eighteen months ago we did install bollards outside Millen Court, and we are committed to install new bollards in the Bull Hill/ The Street area. The order for this has been raised some time ago, though our contractors have something of a backlog; it should nonetheless be delivered soon. I did also make an effort to secure measures to address problems at the junction of Horton Road, Bull Hill and The Street, including a site meeting, but there was a difference of view between Parish Councillors and the officer from Kent Highways, and so far we do not have agreement.

I have sought to address the widespread concerns over bus routes serving the village, such as the ending of the West Kent number 2 service last summer and consequent greater reliance on the Arriva 414. As a County Council, we have quite a good dialogue with Arriva. However, it remains the case that most services are run on a commercial basis; they are neither commissioned nor subsidised by KCC. (This goes even for most buses serving schools, which is inevitably a big part of my post bag). The County Council does provide subsidy for some routes, albeit only about 3% of the total, and last summer launched its 'Big Conversation' on new forms of public transport support. Options considered include feeder services from more remote areas to the main bus network; a 'bookable bus' service; and a taxi-bus service. A number of pilot schemes will run in different parts of the County from the summer; this will include a pilot taxi-bus service running in part of the Darent Valley coming through Shoreham and Otford to Sevenoaks. There is currently no pilot affecting Horton Kirby and South Darenth, but if the pilot schemes are successful, there may be more possibilities in the future.

I mentioned that I have responsibility for Education, and on 1 March we had National Offer Day for secondary school places. We have overall continued to be successful County-wide in expanding capacity in our secondary schools to meet rising roll numbers. This year, just under 80% of families secured their first choice of school, and more than 95% secured one of their four choices. However, there are signs of growing pressures in the Sevenoaks area and surrounding villages, and some children have regrettably been 'allocated' (being offered a school for which they did not express a preference) a place quite some distance away, though I have seen less evidence of it further north in the District, such as Horton Kirby and South Darenth. It is to be hoped that in many cases this will be resolved through appeals and waiting lists; National Offer Day is the start, not the conclusion of the process. Recognition of this pressure lies behind the expansion of Trinity by 2 Forms of Entry (60 places per school year) and the likelihood that there will be expansion at Knole too. The County Council also remains committed to securing a boys' grammar annex in Sevenoaks, though this is a complex task.

Similarly, mid-April saw National Offer Day for primary school places. Here we are able to deliver a very high level of parental preference, with over 97% of families securing one of their three preferences and over 89% getting their first preference. With the overall size of the cohort steady, there are in fact a number of surplus places across the County, including in Sevenoaks. In this context, it is encouraging that the village school had a healthier position in terms of preferences and places offered than was the case last year.

The County Council set its budget this year with an increase in council tax of 5% (the 3% maximum allowed without a referendum, plus a 2% 'precept' for social care). This comes along with some £45 million in savings. Over the last seven years the County Council has already made savings of more than £600 million. Pressures remain severe because of rising demand for social services in particular (both adults and children's), coupled with reductions in central government grant. The fate of Northamptonshire County Council, which is being broken up amid financial crisis, shows what can happen – and quickly – to an upper-tier authority which loses control of its financial position. Kent happily is not in that position, but the structural pressures remain severe.

<u>District Councillor's report Cllr Philip McGarvey –</u> <u>for April 2019</u>

Before anyone else asks, no, as a District Councillor I do not get a vote on Brexit. This current mess is not of our making.

No, it is down to us at SDC to keep emptying your bins every week – and we are one of very few Councils still doing weekly collections. A challenge to that will arise if the post-Brexit roads get clogged in getting our unrecyclables over to the incineration plant at Allington. (SDC does not send anything to landfill.) But SDC has a particularly good relationship with Kent Police and other agencies, so the rubbish will still get through. To be fair, it is more about having the experience and mechanisms in place ready to respond to situations quickly, rather than to plan for every eventuality at this stage.

You may recall how HK&SD Parish used to lose out over Bank Holidays – especially when 4 times out of 7, Christmases fell on a weekend or immediately after – HKSD bin collections were mostly on Mondays and so used to get postponed for an extra week or 8 days. But because the crews at SDC have agreed to go the extra mile – and do extra collections on Fridays and work on Saturdays after a Bank Holiday – no collections should be more than 1 day or maybe 2 days later after a Bank Holiday now. I hope you have noticed the difference. I take my hat off to the lads at Dunbrik – but I keep my gloves on.

You will have seen from your Council Tax bill that SDC has kept its increase to 2.97% in 2019/20 (though the printed bill has rounded that to one decimal figure, so it shows as 3.0%) – but the SDC part of your bill is less than one eighth of the total (11.6%) - the lion's share of almost two thirds (65.0%) going to KCC.

Planning Applications and Enforcement issues continue to be problematic occasionally, and only last month I got the SDC Leader to acknowledge at a Cabinet meeting that the SDC Enforcement Team and Legal Team are under-resourced, and we do need to fix that.

SDC's Local Plan did indeed open several cans of worms. The big one was a speculative proposal by developers (so don't blame SDC!) to build 2,500 homes on the golf course at Pedham Place, Farningham. But because Kent Highways and Highways England have not made their responses – which will inevitably show that the roads and general infrastructure would not support 2,500 homes there - SDC has not yet received the technical 8

evidence to have them reject this proposal outright, so the site is still included in the Local Plan being submitted to The Inspectorate for his approval – but only as a "broad location for growth". In other words, they like the site, but they don't like the proposal. (Maybe it should become a farm for solar panels!)

Because the Local Plan and the entire process remains fluid, additional planning proposals can still be submitted after the consultation closed in September 2018 – and indeed 4 have been already, but more could follow. These late additions have not enjoyed the benefit of scrutiny as did the sites in the 2018 consultation, and they will therefore be judged accordingly. Don't forget that none of these sites are "Planning Applications", and if the Inspectorate approves the principle(s) of the Local Plan as a package or in bits, those sites would still have to individually submit Planning Applications in the normal way.

We have been very fortunate this past year to have had Cllr Mrs Pat Bosley (West Kingsdown) as SDC Chairman, as she has really thrown herself into the charity-work side of the role, and meeting lots of organisations, groups and charities. It will be a hard act for Cllr John Edwards-Winser (Otford) to follow!

I am pleased to report that we are back to full strength after Brian Carroll was elected to SDC in the second seat here, back in August. Unfortunately pressure of work – in fact, pressure of promotion – meant that Ingrid Chetram no longer had time to attend to council work, and I was holding the fort for a while. So she had to step down, and up popped Brian.

In conclusion, I thank our Parish Councillors and Parish Clerks for their superb contributions to the Council and to the villages again – and I wish any of them stepping down in May a happy retirement - and my thanks for their support and patience with me. And I thank our supportive residents too.

Report from the Recreation and Open Spaces Committee

Plans are underway now to install toilet facilities at Heathside after the costs and company were agreed at the last Parish meeting. We hope that these will be installed in time for the summer holidays.

I am pleased to confirm that we were successful with our funding application for a drinking fountain from the Metropolitan Drinking and Cattle Trough Association, this has already been purchased on our behalf and will be installed at Heathside at the same time as the toilet installation. We have now signed the documents that will complete the transfer of land from Sevenoaks District Council to the Parish Council in respect of the amenity land at Montgomery Road, Shrubbery Road, East Hill, Glebe Place and Saxon Place. Shrubbery Road was recently submitted on the "call for sites", so the transfer will safe guard the future for these areas. We will be consulting with neighbours on how best to manage and look after these areas.

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE HALLS

Since the last newsletter there have been several maintenance projects completed in the Village Hall. The kitchen has been refurbished – the old floor covering that had become warped by water damage has been replaced, the cupboards have been painted inside and out and new handles have been fitted to both the cupboards and the drawers. Report from Darent River Preservation Society



Malcolm Dunn – DRIPS

Major homes plan could put Darent under pressure

Plans to build thousands more homes in and around North West Kent could pose a threat to the River Darent and its catchment.

A new 2,500 – home town is among the 79 possible sites put forward under the Sevenoaks Local Plan.

Residents in Hartley and its surroundings are extremely concerned and have voiced their opposition to the plans which would seriously affect them. Much of the area is narrow country roads as you know.

Reports indicate that the Government wants the Sevenoaks Region to build up to 13,900 homes in total over the next 20 years.

DRiPS has pledged to monitor developments in order to help minimise any possible impact on the river and its ecology.

Aquifers

"That equals an extra 5,225,000 litres of water required every day", says Stuart Merrylees chairman of DRiPS. "Over 5 million - an enormous amount".

"If that amount was withdrawn from our aquifers without regard for the consequences, then before long there will be no River Darent, or River Cray either".

Stuart continues. "Government, Ofwat and Thames Water have to provide us with solutions – For example, more reservoirs – or our environment will change for ever".

The Darent River Preservation Society is now working closely with the South East River Trust, Environment Agency, North West Kent

Countryside Partnership, local Angling Clubs and Thames Water.

Together we will continue to take a keen interest in any emerging plans or proposals.

The Valley Players was started in 1949 but the origins are rather lost in the mists of time. As far as we know they were based at the old Sutton-at-Hone Village Hall and when that hall was rebuilt in 1978, Valley Players made a donation of £50. From 1949 to 1951 a series of one act plays were presented although we have no record of which plays these were, but we know that in 1952 "Easy Money" was the first multi-act play performed. That year there was just the one play but commencing in 1953 most years saw a Spring and an Autumn production. During May 1979 rehearsals were at the Fleetdown Community Centre, presumably while the rebuilding was going on.

Around 1980, because there was no stage at Sutton-at-Hone Village Hall, Valley Players moved to Horton Kirby & South Darenth Village Hall. An item in the accounts for that year was £3 for the hire of a lorry, possibly to transport the props to the new hall.

Between November 1977 and March 1987 Sutton Court was used for rehearsals for reasons of cost.

The group always donated money to the Cancer Research Campaign and raised many thousands of pounds over the years, receiving certificates of thanks from the local representative of the charity.

Around 1996 Valley Players joined forces with the Women's Institute who produced the Village Pantomime each year and we have gradually taken over this production on behalf of the WI. In fact, since 2015 this has been our only annual production due to a reduction in the number of members and rising costs of producing plays but we hope to revive the production of plays in the near future. We are a friendly group (yes, I know, they ALL say that but we really are) and it really is fun to do. You don't have to "tread the boards" if you don't want to. There is always room for back stage folks, making props and scenery, making teas on performance nights, prompting during performances, and we usually find time for a relaxing drink at a local hostelry afterwards, not to mention a meal out a couple of times a year.

We generally meet on Tuesday or Thursday evenings at 8pm from September onwards at the Jubilee Hall or Village Hall, so if you fancy yourself as a thespian, do get in touch with the Parish Office to check when we are next meeting.

Archie Steer, Corona Grant, Jack Hinchev, Katie Tremain, Lucas Savill and Riley Harman, who will all now be moving on to our Explorer Scout section for more challenges and adventures, and of course, fun!
