Message from Cllr Peter Rushbrook Chair HKSD Parish Council

So thankfully with things very slowly, but gradually, returning to normal and the weather getting warmer, it is great to see our community beginning to show signs of life again.

During lockdown Parish Councillors have been working hard on various projects. A new road surface has been laid in Franks Lane with chevrons for the bridge width markers. Please take it slowly when driving along the road - there are always walkers with dogs and sometimes horses in and around the bridge area.

We now have CCTV at Westminster Field and upgraded the CCTV system for the Village hall and Heathside. This has been very useful with the recent vandalism to the Cherry trees and the playground at Heathside, footage of both was sent to the Police.

We have been working in conjunction with the various organisations to help reduce the instances of flooding at Westminster Field. I must make it clear that the whole playing field is a natural flood plain and that it will remain so but hopefully with the measures that are now in place and further possible works later in this year, the severe flooding that we have seen recently will be reduced.

New measures to help with parking around The Street are underway which includes a new overflow car parking area in Westminster field. Hopefully, residents near to this area will not have the same troubles as they had last year with people visiting Westminster Field to enjoy the open space, picnic area and river.

With the move towards electric cars the Parish Council have been looking into EV points for both the Village Hall and Westminster Field car parks, surveys have been carried out and we are awaiting the reports.

A map for Cherry Tree Avenue will be installed on the Pavilion wall in Westminster Field in the next few weeks along with a notice board to keep people informed about ongoing works in Westminster Field.

We were very lucky to get the Local Restrictions Support Scheme grant and the Closed Business Lockdown payment to try and offset the monies we have lost over the past year due to the Covid-19. This has gone a long way to helping us keep the precept to zero increase.

Our local pubs have also been busy painting, polishing, and building new seating, flower beds and even a new playground area. It is fantastic that we have not lost any of these vital assets to our villages, no doubt we will all show them, plus local shops and businesses, our support now that the weather is getting better. To finish I would like to remind everyone that you are all very welcome to come to the Parish Council meetings held on the first Monday of every month. If you would like to put your name down to volunteer for any of the community days, then please drop a message to us.

Look after yourselves and stay safe.

Report from the Buildings Committee

At the time of writing the buildings (Village Hall, Jubilee Hall, and the Pavilion) are still under Covid regulations and as a result the Parish Council has lost an important source of income over the past 12 months. However, we are grateful that Riverside Pre-School was able to continue during lockdown and we look forward to welcoming back some of our regular users as lockdown is eased. The WI and LHS both hope to return in June/July and two new regular hirers have started – Hart Beeps (a mother & toddler group) on a Thursday and Wing Chun Kung Fu group who will meet on Tuesday evenings and Saturday mornings.

A new fire alarm system has been installed in the halls and CCTV was added to the Pavilion (covering the car park and Westminster Field) and the Halls CCTV was enhanced to cover a wider area.

Asbestos reports were carried out for the Village Hall and Pavilion and the certificate updated.

As the situation eases, we will be pleased to accept bookings from casual hirers and potential new regular hirers.

Report from the Recreation and Open Spaces Committee

The ROS committee have been keeping busy over the past year despite only having meetings virtually. Our yearly inspections of the Allotments and Parish burial ground still went ahead as usual without any major concerns. A new handrail has been installed in the burial ground to help assist those with walking difficulties and bulbs have been planted by Christine Page.

In Westminster Field we are planning on easier access into the river from the picnic area and the dog river access has been completed with a new hedge planted to partition it from the main picnic area.

Unfortunately, a couple of the cherry blossom trees in the avenue have been the victim of vandalism and will be replaced. However, the culprits have been caught on the newly installed CCTV and footage passed to the police for their investigations.

We have recently completed the overflow car park which will be used during busy periods to ease the parking congestion on the Street and Bull Hill.

The Parish Council have upgraded to a new booking system which has resulting in us being able to look after the football pitches and pavilion. This in turn will allow us to reinvest monies raised from the hiring out of the facilities back into pitch and pavilion upgrades without the need to reduce services in other areas of the community. So far, the pitch furthest from the pavilion has been seeded and top soiled and should be ready for the new season.

Heathside has seen extra CCTV cameras installed which now cover the whole area including the buildings and hall car park. As a result, we have been able to identify when vandalism occurs quickly and request police attendance.

Tarmac has been laid at the entrance to Heathside as the ground was uneven and it was particularly difficult for those with mobility problems and prams.

Shrubbery Road has now had the remains of the old playground removed with the slide donated to a local pub. The new playground will be installed at the beginning of May. You can see the plans on the next page.

From a request from a resident in Horton Kirby, KCC highways agreed that the two grass verges on the corner of School Lane and Lombard Street be transformed into wildflower areas. If this proves to be successful, we could start to see more areas like this in the future, making new natural flora and fauna habitats to encourage wildlife.

We were successful in our Woodland Trust bid and were awarded 30 saplings (Silver Birch, Rowan, and Wild Cherry) which will be planted in Westminster Field.

Shrubbery Road Playground

The previous playground at Shrubbery Road was beyond its useful life and was starting to fail inspections, so this was the perfect opportunity to look at whether it should be replaced at Shrubbery Road or moved to the Top Paddock. The Top Paddock was being considered as an option as it is an underutilised area of land that has been a victim of fly tipping, used by inconsiderate dog owners and has neighbouring residents requesting new fencing and landscaping. These issues may have been resolved if this was chosen as the location. It would have opened the possibility of allowing roadside parking at Shrubbery Road in the future by moving the existing fencing in by no more than two metres, keeping the remaining grassed area available for soft landscaping. However, after resident feedback the Shrubbery Road site was the preferred choice.

Work to remove the old playground has already been carried out, with the slide donated to a local pub for their garden.

Installation will start at the beginning of May taking up to two weeks to fully complete.

Parish Council Awards 2020-2021

The Parish Council has made two awards this year and both are very worthy recipients of our Certificate.

Nicola Wallace has carried out a lot of good work during the pandemic and the lockdown. In 2020 she approached the local supermarkets and encouraged them to donate Easter eggs for children and key workers in the villages. She took the eggs to local schools - the target was 1000 eggs, but Nicola delivered over 3,000! She has collected items for food banks for St Mary's Child Charity, Greenhithe and supported the Living Well Charity, Holy Trinity, Dartford. In July 2020 she made up hampers and sent them to small businesses that had worked through the pandemic and to other individuals who had given up time to help. In August she organised a craft stall at the Co-op in South Darenth in aid of Mind. She encouraged children to help her and her son Findlay and raised over £1,200 for Mind. She later organised a project to raise awareness of the need for food banks and set up a GoFundMe page for St. Mary's Child food Bank in Greenhithe. Sutton Manor nursery donated a gnarled olive tree to help fundraise for the project - this raised £2,180. She organised a Halloween Trail with prizes, again for Mind. In December she delivered homemade cakes to carers in the villages. Nicola is an amazing organiser and involves a variety of people, both adults and children, in her projects. She works tirelessly for deserving causes.

John Woodhead has been a stalwart of the local history society since it started in 1994. He was involved in the production of the book in 1994 to mark the centenary of parish councils – "Horton Kirby and South Darenth, Pictures and Memories of 100 years 1894-1994". For over thirty years John has collected newspaper cuttings and photographs of the villages. He was very much involved with the campaign against the Channel Tunnel rail link coming through South Darenth and produced a book to mark the success of the campaign – "Sinking the Link" (2012). Over the years John has interviewed and recorded some of the memories of the older residents in the villages and has produced a series of booklets ("In Their Own Words"). To mark the 125th anniversary of the Parish Council, in 2019 John used photographs from his collection and from others in the LHS and villages to produce "Horton Kirby and South Darenth – Yesterday and Today". John has been a committee member of the LHS since its foundation and in recent years has served as Minutes Secretary. He has worked tirelessly for the society. He will be missed by everyone who knew him.

John and Helen have now moved to Cumbria and we wish them well in their new life. John's vast collection of newspaper cuttings back to 1990 are now in the archives and the society's aim is to digitalise them.

Report from Darent River Preservation Society

Rainfall in December 2020 and January 2021 was notably high and exceptionally high in January. 226% above the long-term average in January. Many flood alerts in the South East during this time.

Recharge of groundwater 257% of monthly long-term average. This is quite extraordinary data.

Westminster Field was flooded again during the last two weeks of January.

Reservoirs in Kent are full except Bewl which is 92% full at the time of writing 23/4/21.

We are in a good position to deal with 2021 even with a hot dry summer.

The Darent does suffer from low flow usually by September then autumn, winter rain in the valley "tops up" the river.

Rainfall in March and April has been much lower this year, but ground water reserves are high. The present data and observations suggest that this is a repeat of 2020 currently.

As a result of the Darent Action Plan which was completed a few years ago, water abstraction is well away from the Darent and some pumping stations close to the Darent have been shut down – or running at reduced capacity. Steps have been taken to safeguard our river and the benefits are enormous.

There are two variables which can affect the river. Obviously, the weather and the other is public demand.

Should expansive housing development in this area go ahead, then this will have to be seriously considered. I have not heard of any plans or consultations yet. It is just a possibility.

DRiPS continue to be involved and in consultation with the North West Kent Countryside Partnership, Thames 21, South East Rivers Trust, the Environment Agency, and Thames Water.

Further meetings are in the pipeline.

HORTON KIRBY AND SOUTH DARENTH PARISH COUNCIL GRANTS

The Parish Council awards grants, at its discretion, to community organisations who demonstrate a clear need for financial support. The organisation must be either non-profit making or charitable. The organisation will normally be expected to have clearly written aims and objectives, a written constitution and membership rules, copies of which should be submitted as part of the application. An organisation is normally required to have a bank account in its own name with two authorised representatives.

In 2020 the Grants Committee agreed to award grants to 'We are Beams' and the Kent Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance.

'We are Beams' is a local charity that supports disabled children and their families in Kent and Medway. The disabled children and young people who access their services are aged between 4–19 years. They will usually have one or multiple learning difficulties, complex health needs and challenging behaviour. 'We Are Beams' work is divided into four key areas; Short Breaks Services; Family Advice Service, Direct Payment Service and Dragon's Retreat. They were given £1000 to allow them to purchase televisions for their 6 bedded Dragon's Retreat Respite Centre.

Kent, Surrey, and Sussex Air Ambulance were awarded £750 to help them continue to save lives. They operate 24 hours per day, 365 days per year and attend over 2,500 missions. Very recently the Air Ambulance touched down in the Heathside to come to the aid of an unwell person.

Applications for a grant must be from either a non-profit making or charitable organisation and are open from 1st January to 31 December 2021. For more information and the application form, please either contact the Parish council's website:

We've also been holding some services of Evensong (without the singing) at St Mary's; Remembrance Sunday was marked at the war memorial; craft packs have been distributed; funerals in church have continued throughout lockdown and, happily, confetti now studs the churchyard path as wedding season has begun. If you have been wondering about holding a wedding or a funeral at St Mary's, please get in touch. You do not need to be a churchgoer to be eligible and warmly welcomed.

Throughout the pandemic not only has church life continued but bills have of course also needed to be paid. Insurance costs continue, as does the ongoing maintenance of the building. It is now possible to set up a one-off or regular donation to the church (which is a charity, and so relies on donations) at https://cafdonate.cafonline.org/13900. Continued and increased donations are vital to the ongoing presence of St Mary's within the community: it will not survive without them. Every contribution makes a difference.

Also thanks to those who helped to tidy up the churchyard last October; to St Mary's fabric committee who have continued to care for the building with great commitment (remember that The Bull pub hosted the star that usually sits on St Mary's tower last Christmas? it's because the flagpole had broken in a storm and embedded itself in the roof: there are always pieces of work to be done on maintaining such a large and historic building!); and finally to the churchwarden Anne Williams and all who support her: without them church life at St Mary's wouldn't be able to continue, and they serve the church and wider community with great care and love. We are lucky to have them.

If the pandemic or anything else has raised questions of faith and meaning for you, I am here and always glad to talk with you, or to pray for you.

Whilst the varying intensities of lockdown have been very disruptive to the work of the Darent Valley Landscape Partnership Scheme, the team has been working hard and our activities have continued to progress all along the valley between the Dartford Marshes and Westerham.

Our Landscape Heritage Grant Scheme has been launched and we are looking for interesting and innovative ideas to help people care for, explore, enjoy, learn about, and celebrate the wonderful landscape and heritage of the Darent Valley. Grants of between £1,000 and £15,000 are available and we are particularly keen to see community-based applications coming from the northern end of the valley. The criteria are very broad and could include art-based activities as well as those that involve practical conservation work. Just head to our dedicated webpage at

<u>www.darent-valley.org.uk/projects/community/local-landscape-grants/</u> for more information. If you have an idea, submit a quick 'Expression of Interest' and we can help you develop your idea.

We will shortly also be launching our Community Curated Local Landscape Trails project. We would like each parish in the valley to develop a walking trail that introduces the local landscape and its hidden heritage and history to residents and visitors. This might utilise an existing route or could be an entirely new one. Our funding will help you to improve the paths used, develop signage and interpretation, and produce an audio guide to be included on our new Darent Valley app. In addition to the National Lottery Heritage Fund, funding for this is being provided through EXPERIENCE, an Interreg Channel project through the European Regional Development Programme. The aim is to develop sustainable experiences that attract visitors, especially in the off-season.

The one element that has been of particular concern and a priority to Horton Kirby and South Darent parishioners is the condition of the Darent Valley Path between Station Road and Westminster Fields. The good news is that we will be working to provide a solution to the problems caused by water-logging and poor surface this summer. The new DVLPS Access Officer will be working with the parish council and KCC Rights of Way to deliver this ahead of the weather deteriorating again in the autumn.

If just like me you have been feeling out of sync and longing for some routine and discipline back in your life, yoga could be the perfect answer. During the on and off lockdowns we have been online with our virtual yoga class. This was perfect while all other activities were suspended, and this virtual class felt like a real tonic!

Now we are looking forward to the summer and returning to the Jubilee Hall so we can practice yoga together and receive more individual guidance. Why practice yoga?

Yoga is an ancient scientific practice which originated from India and has evolved over thousands of years. More recently, there have been many studies proving that yoga can help improve quality of life and can help to maintain a fit and healthy body, and mind.

The word yoga is a Sanskrit word which means union, or more specifically yoke. When we practice yoga, we are trying to unify or bring balance to the mind, the body, and the breath.

Studies have also shown that yoga helps to improve circulation, digestion, balance, flexibility, and agility. Yoga can also help to maintain and even improve functional capacity such as concentration and endurance. Yoga postures are specifically designed to strengthen muscles, tendons, ligaments, and joints. The poses (asana) are performed with specific alignment and are mindfully executed. Yoga, much like Pilates, also improves core strength which is essential to promote healthy backs and hips which prevent trips and falls.

Yoga improves mental strength and has a calming effect; this in turn not only relieves tension but can help you have a better night's sleep.

The breathing practices of yoga known as pranayama increase lung capacity which in turn delivers more oxygen to the body and helps with overall performance and efficiency. This relieves soreness and enhances tissue repair.

Relaxation and meditation practices allow the body to rest and digest and induce the relaxation response switching off the flight, fight, freeze response which can cause stress and anxiety.

The question therefore is, why wouldn't you practice yoga?
